In Memoriam

Susan A. Furnary, educator, coach and athletic administrator passed away May 31, 2021 at the Coastal Hospice and Atria of Salisbury. She was 72 and a resident in Ocean Pines, MD.

Sue was born February 21, 1949 and grew up in Silver Spring, MD. She was a 1967 graduate from Northwood High School. After high school Sue went on to Frostburg State College graduating with a bachelor's degree in 1971. She, also, earned a master's degree from Eastern Illinois University.

Sue taught physical education at Lake Clifton High School in Baltimore City from 1975-1981. While at Lake Clifton she coached softball and boys' soccer. In addition, she was an assistant basketball coach at Towson State University from 1976-1979 and for two years she was an assistant coach at the College of Notre Dame in Baltimore.



In 1980, Sue coached Women's Basketball at the University of Maryland Baltimore County for 13 years. She led the team to their first winning season and earned an invitation to the ECAC South Atlantic Championships in 1984-85. Sue was named the Mason Dixon Conference Coach of the Year. During the 1984 through the 1986 seasons her teams was ranked 20th in the nation for Division II schools. In 1986-87, her team played their first season in the NCAA Division I classification.

In 1994, Sue became the athletic director at Kenwood High School. Ron Belinko, Coordinator of Athletics for the Baltimore County Public Schools said, "Sue was clearly a nice candidate over a lot of good candidates for the job."

In 2001, Sue left Kenwood and moved to the Eastern Shore where she accepted a special education teaching position at Mardela Middle and High School. After she retired from Mardela she continued to mentor students in the Wicomico County Public Schools.

Sue loved life. She enjoyed playing golf, tennis, fishing and swimming and playing in the ocean.

Sue is survived by her spouse, Becky Clark; her in-laws Nancy and Herb Clark and Paul and Jessica Clark; her brother Nick; and two nieces and a nephew. She is predeceased by her parents, Margaret and Nick.

What are the Rules Regarding COVID-19 and the Athletic Programs Around the State?

Well, it depends if it's a public school athletic association or a private school athletic association. And it depends on the county the public school is in or in the case of the private schools – the school. Then each local school system, with guidance from the state and local departments of health can develop plans and guidelines to help maximize safe student participation in the athletic programs.

Maryland Public Secondary Schools Athletic Association (MPSSAA)

Roadmap for Return of Interscholastic Athletics (COVID-19 Updates)

The Maryland Public Secondary Schools Athletic Association continues to provide guidance for local school systems (LSS) to provide a continuity of participation in athletics and activities in a safe and controlled environment. The MPSSAA is committed to continuously work with the State Superintendent of Schools, LSS, the medical community, and counterpart state associations to develop plans that will return these highly educational programs with a goal of maximizing student participation. This page will serve as a resource for the MPSSAA community to track the current efforts for the return of athletics and activities and next steps for the association.

2021-2022 Current Status:

COVID-19 Policies and Procedures

1. Local School Systems are encouraged to use the layered approach found in the Maryland Department of Health and the Maryland State Department of Education [K12 School and Childcare Covid-19 Guidance](#). (Revised August 13, 2021)
2. All participants, coaches, officials, athletic administrators, spectators, and any other individual present at any interscholastic athletic practice or competition must adhere to the local school system policies and procedures for COVID-19 mitigation.
3. The MPSSAA, at its discretion, may implement additional individual team and sport mitigation strategies to further reduce the risk of spreading Covid-19 based on the most recent guidance of the Maryland Department of Health.
4. Multi-Jurisdictional Competition - Each local school system may have implemented COVID-19 policies and procedures in place in accordance with Maryland Department of Health, MPSSAA, and local school and health department requirements. During any multi-jurisdictional competition, the policies and procedures of the hosting sites jurisdiction shall be followed by all competing schools. When conflicts arise in which representatives, including but not limited to coaches, participants, and spectators, are not following the mandated COVID-19 policies and procedures of the local school system, the site director in collaboration with school administration shall have the authority to:
 - a. Initially provide a warning to those not in compliance to adhere to the local school system policies.
 - b. Suspend the competition and refer the conflict to Supervisors of Athletics for resolution.
 - c. Unresolved matters shall be referred to the MPSSAA Executive Director.
5. Shared Responsibility - Games and Events will be contested on the basis of shared responsibilities. Personnel from the visiting schools must accept their joint responsibilities with the persons in charge for the supervision and maintenance of behavior on the part of students, spectators, and participants. This includes COVID-19 mitigation policies and procedures, good sportsmanship, exemplary behavior, and protection of property before, during and after each contest.
6. Point of Emphasis - The MPSSAA would like to make a point of emphasis for coaches. Coaches are reminded that you set the tone for your team and are the foremost influential figures representing your school. Your adherence and the adherence of your team and school to the mitigation requirements and recommendations

will be a determining factor on the ability of these programs to continue operating within the modifications caused by COVID-19.

7. COVID-19 Exposure During the Tournament - All local school system policies will be followed related to a COVID-19 positive case or exposure during the state tournament. The following procedures will be utilized for determining the continuity of participation if one of these situations occurs.
 - a. If a team is unable to advance in the state tournament due to COVID-19 the following shall occur.
 - i. If the teams have not played each other, the non-COVID team will advance to the next round of competition.
 - ii. If the teams have played each other and the advancing team cannot proceed due to COVID, the team scheduled to play next will receive a bye/forfeit and advance to the subsequent round.
 - b. If a school has difficulty after the state tournament begins and the school must withdraw from the tournament the following shall occur.
 - i. If a team/individual has entered the state tournament and must withdraw for reasons other than COVID, leave the field of play before the completion of a contest, or fails to continue play when eligible to do so, it will be considered conduct detrimental to the state tournament and penalties may be imposed.
 - ii. When a team/individual competes and loses during the state tournament, the losing team/individual does not advance if the winning team/individual is unable to compete in the next round. The next round game will become a forfeit and the team scheduled to play will advance to the next round.

Maryland Interscholastic Athletic Association (MIAA) and Interscholastic Athletic Association of Maryland (IAAM)

The Maryland Interscholastic Athletic Association (MIAA) and the Interscholastic Athletic Association of Maryland (IAAM) are working on finalizing an approach that will be utilized during the winter sports season. Unlike the public-school counterparts, due to the varied nature and independent, individual differences of our member schools, the MIAA and the IAAM will not be mandating that the schools take any particular action when it comes to vaccines and/or testing. Each member school will determine what is deemed to be in the best interest of their particular institution. Most of the member schools already have a relatively high vaccination rate among their student bodies. The schools have done a great job of working together to keep the league and each other informed of implemented practices and protocol requirements at their locations.

This email is to provide you an early welcome to the 2021 NIAAA Conference at Denver, Co. And Welcome back to the In-Person National Conference. This correspondence serves as a first opportunity to invite you as an Athletic Administrator to get involved in the successful presentation of LTI Classes during the Conference. Each year the NIAAA Conference presents LTI Classes taught by a National Staff for the benefit of Athletic Administrators attending the Conference. Volunteer LTI Facilitators play a major role in the efficient presentation of classes, which enhances the experience of enrolled participants. This year as many as Fifty Four (54) Classes may be presented in four different time slots, beginning Saturday, December 11 thru Monday, December 13th. The up to 54 classes may be the largest and greatest offering of LTI Classes in one place and time. I am confident we will be able to fill the up to One Hundred and Eight (108) Facilitator Slots required to manage the on-site sign-in and distribution of materials that occurs at the beginning of each class, and the sign-out process of participants at the end of the classes.

This is a formal request by the NIAAA for your service as a Volunteer LTI Facilitator.

TO SIGNUP:

The signup process is simple and efficient. It also allows for a volunteer to serve as a Facilitator while maintaining their conference schedule. *(It is possible for you to facilitate for a class in which you are enrolled)* **Due to the ongoing Covid Pandemic, there may be changes in class enrollments and schedules. You will be notified if a change occurs in your selection as a facilitator and work to accommodate your next selection.**

Please follow these next instructions in order to sign up as a Volunteer Facilitator: Please note; this is the only process that allows you to view the schedules, select, commit, and serve as a facilitator!

- A link below is provided for you to click on to sign up as a facilitator.
- Please click on the link to open the hyper link, the facilitator schedule will appear. It is important that you place your name, phone number, and email address in the time slot next to the class you are committing to as a Facilitator.
- Volunteers are allowed and encouraged to choose more than one session. (At least two selections) However, you will need to reopen the hyperlink and sign up for each session you wish to make a commitment.
- If you find your first choice has already been chosen by someone else, please make another selection, and continue to do so until you have confirmed your selection.
- Your commitment is very important to the success of the Facilitator Volunteer Service Plan.
- We initially will assign two facilitators to each class. However, assignments maybe adjusted based on the number of persons enrolled in each class. Volunteer scheduling is on a first-come, first served basis. *A small class enrollment may result in one facilitator assignment, with a second facilitator being rescheduled to a class with a larger enrollment.*

SUMMARY OF VOLUNTEER DUTIES:

Volunteers will report for service one hour prior to the start of the class of which you have a confirmed commitment, to arrange materials and receive final on-site instructions. Sign-in duties are to begin no more than 30 minutes before the start time of class and must be maintained through 15 minutes after the start of classes. All materials are to be turned in to the LTI Office immediately after the completion of the sign-in process. Volunteer Facilitators may leave the area after they have turned in materials, but must return to their assignment 30 minutes before the end of class for sign-out duties. If you are enrolled in the class, you will manage both the sign-in and sign-out duties before and at the end of your class. In class facilitators will be allowed late entry into the class after turning in sign in materials, and allowed to leave class a little early to obtain scanners to sign out class participants. Scanners will be assigned to Facilitators at the beginning of each class. Facilitators will turn in scanners and sign-in sheets, at the end of each sign-in period, in the LTI Office. Facilitators will return to the LTI Office to be re-assigned a scanner for the sign-out process of students for the class which you have been assigned.

The IAAM history of the league, our mission, and some policies were reviewed. Also included was the opportunity to answer questions and talk about athletics for young women and the uniqueness and benefits of our league.

The **Partnership with The Positive Coaching Alliance** begins its second year, offering seasonal workshops for our coaches and administrators.

The **9th Annual Leadership Conference** for student-athletes in leadership roles will be held in person on Friday, November 12, 2021, at Roland Park Country School. We anticipate 100% participation and are thrilled to be in-person. Schools may register three athletes and one adult for this half-day, multi-presentation symposium. The theme for the year, **Making Teams Better**.

Evaluation of Realignment and Change of Conference process: This initiative has been in the works with discussions, brainstorming and gathering information for nine months. Doug Lagarde, from Severn School and Chair of the Competition Committee will discuss this as part of the Heads of School agenda. The goal is to improve our

transparency, consistency, and desire for balance within the conference structure. Sport-specific criteria has been drafted by the athletic directors for the **Competition Committee** to review in early November. The IAAM athletic directors have looked at two models (1) improving the current system and (2) relegation. For the current year, the committee will work within our current framework.

IAAM Inspires: The IAAM is preparing to launch a new segment for our website entitled, "**IAAM Inspires**" – it is a monthly video podcast highlighting student-athletes who go beyond "the game" - sharing their stories and supporting their efforts. It has become clear, especially over this past year, that our student-athletes give of themselves, far beyond the playing surfaces and the IAAM would like to highlight them to acknowledge the well-rounded athlete. With the fall season winding down and the winter season gearing up, there are a lot of moving pieces and dozens of balls in the air. The league could not function without the support of our Athletic Directors and Heads of School – thank you!!

MIDDLE SCHOOLS

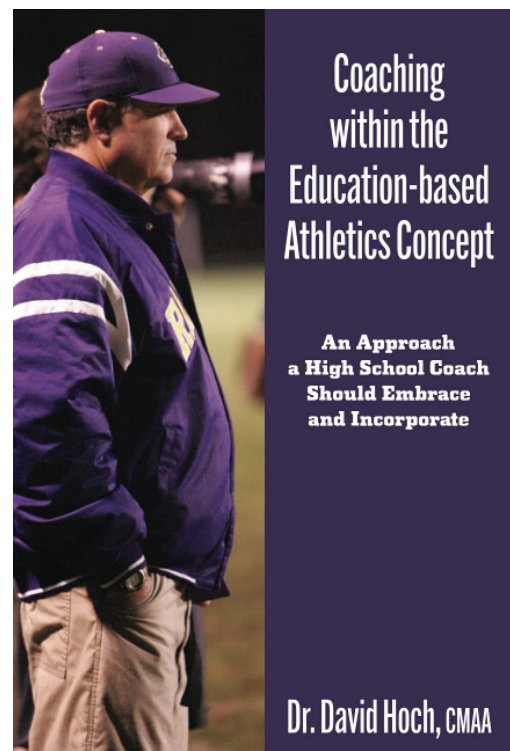
Four of the state's middle schools have new athletic directors.
